"We are always looking for opportunities to champion children, whether that be through clinics, player meet and greets or other inclusion activities like the Book Club," he said.

"Sport is a fantastic way to promote children's literacy because the kids are just so receptive to the players.

"Studies show that physical education can improve brain function and academic performance, so to combine the two really is a no-brainer."

In a partnership with sponsors Westbooks, 4000 sets of the books – which have been added to the State Library of WA's heritage section – have been donated to Western Australian primary schools, a further 250 sets to WA regional libraries and 100 sets to Perth Children's Hospital.
